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Proposal presented for student-housing at Sheraton Tower

A proposal to transform one of the two towers comprising the Sheraton Boston Hotel in the Back Bay from temporary into permanent student housing for Northeastern University was the topic at hand during a virtual meeting sponsored by the Boston Planning & Development Agency on Thursday, Sept. 21.

Hawkins Way Capital, a Beverly Hill, Calif.-based private equity firm, together with Värde Partners, an international investment firm, reportedly purchased the hotel at 39 Dalton St. for \$233 million from Host Hotels & Resorts in February of 2022. The hotel comprises two towers, with the North Tower continuing to operate as a hotel. The South Tower has served as temporary dorm space for Northeastern undergraduates since the summer/fall of 2020, when the city and BPDA approved this usage amid the pandemic, and because of the pressing need for more college dorm rooms throughout Boston at that time.

Attorney Dennis Quilty said the applicant intends to eventually amend the site's Planned Development Area (PDA), which is defined by the BPDA as "an overlay zoning district that establishes special zoning controls for large or complex projects," to allow for permanent use of the South Tower as Northeastern student housing. As proposed, approximately 428 sleeping rooms within the existing approximately 250,000-square foot South Tower would be used to permanently house approximately 856 undergraduate stu-

Charlesbank Landing receives gift of \$5 million from Richard and Susan Smith Family Foundation

On Saturday, Sept. 23 at their annual Moondance Gala, the Esplanade Association (EA) publicly announced, and garnered more, major support for Charlesbank Landing on the Esplanade.

once-in-a-generation project will transform more than two dormant acres of the landmarked Charles River Esplanade into a vibrant year-round, universally accessible "landing" space with new welcome center and landscape amenities that will host communities' indoor and outdoor recreational, civic, artistic, educational, environmen-

tal, and cultural activities while providing exceptional and sustainable care for the Commonwealth's most visited state park, according to the nonprofit Esplanade Association, which works in partnership with the state's Department of Conservation and Recreation to care for and maintain the park.

The Richard and Susan Smith Family Foundation (SFF) has appreciated the invaluable contribution that this collaborative project between the Esplanade Association and DCR will make to the physical, mental, social and economic health of the region. On Sept. 23, SFF's \$5 million leadership gift for Charlesbank Landing on the Esplanade was announced among State officials, EA leadership and over 475 Gala guests, spurring additional support among attendees for a vision that directly aligns with the Foundation's mission.

The Foundation, whose philanthropy is dedicated to improving human health, raising educational attainment, increasing economic security, and meeting community needs, recognized early on the potential for Charlesbank Landing. The project will directly enhance the

ANARCHY IN CONGRESS

Imagine if a foreign government or some terrorist group were to hack into the U.S. government's computers and bring all of its operations to a halt. Everyone in the country would be outraged.

That is the scenario we are facing this week -- except that the "hack" that is threatening to shut down our government is not originating from some outside source, but rather is coming from an anarchist group of about 15 Republican members of Congress who are refusing to approve a budget by the October 1 deadline.

There have been government shutdowns in the past, most memorably those engineered by Republican Speakers of the House (Newt Gingrich and John Boehner), but those had clear lines of demarcation about competing visions of federal spending between the Republicans and the Democratic presidents (Clinton and Obama) at the time.

But the small group of Republicans who want to shut down the government today not only lack the support of the Republican leadership and their colleagues, but they also do not have any identifiable objectives.

A lot of the blame for this debacle lies with Republican House Speaker Kevin McCarthy, who had worked out a deal with President Biden and the Democrats in June regarding the debt ceiling that also encompassed the budget for the coming fiscal year.

However, McCarthy is being held hostage by these renegade members of his own party because of their threat to remove him from the speakership if he brings the budget to the floor for a vote -- and thus far, McCarthy has placed his political survival over keeping the government open.

About the only defense for McCarthy's fecklessness is that he himself recognizes that trying to reach an agreement with this group is a fruitless task: "This is a whole new concept of individuals that just want to burn the whole place down," McCarthy said last week.

The bottom line is that every American, thanks to the inept Republican leadership, is subject to the whims of a group of about 15 Republican members of Congress whose only real goal can best be described as a desire to bring about total chaos and anarchy to every corner of our country.

CAN NUCLEAR POWER SAVE THE PLANET?

As it becomes increasingly clear that renewable sources of energy -- wind, solar, hydropower, and hydrogen fuel cells -- are not going to become available on a large scale anytime soon, the only real hope for the U.S. both to reduce its use of fossil fuels and to provide a dependable source of power for the nation's electrical grid is nuclear energy.

Nuclear energy has had a bad rap for almost 50 years in this country thanks to the infamous Three Mile Island debacle in the late 1970s and then the Chernobyl disaster a decade later. But today's nuclear power ain't your grandparents'.

Future nuclear power generation would be provided by what are known as advanced Small Modular Reactors (SMRs). The U.S. government is providing incentives (through the Inflation Reduction Act) to develop these SMRs as safe and affordable nuclear power options for our grid.

We would note that almost 20 percent of our nation's power supply today comes from nuclear plants (in France, 68 percent of its power comes from nuclear plants). With energy demands increasing across the country for the foreseeable future -- electric vehicles for example, still need to use the grid to "fill up" -- the new nuclear power looms as the most obvious choice to remove fossil-burning fuels from our energy supply.

Back Bay Fens pathways project moving ahead as planned

The city's Back Bay Fens pathways project is moving ahead as planned, according to Lauren Bryant, project manager for the Boston Parks Department.

Kyle Zick, the landscape architect for the project, has been busy evaluating the grading and conditions of the pathways, Bryant wrote in a Sept. 27 email.

Moreover, since the city held its last virtual public-meetings on the project in March, the "conceptual grading of the entirety of the Boston Parks-owned property within Back Bay Fens" and a conceptual design for the John Boyle O'Reilly Memorial, which was informed by a meeting with the Fenway Civic Association, are now being finetuned, wrote Bryant.

Likewise, conceptual designs of the pathways surrounding and intersecting the Fenway Victory Gardens informed by input from the president of the Fenway Garden Society, as well as for the World War II Memorial informed by multiple meetings and site visits with the city's George Robert White Fund Trust, who own that property, are now being finalized. The conceptual design for the Evans Way Bridge replacement is nearing completion as well, added Bryant.

The project team has also met and communicated with the Emerald Necklace Conservancy "regarding coordination with other surrounding projects in the area," wrote Bryant, and is also coordinating with the state's Department of Conservation and Recreation on pathways owned by that state agency.

"We are working to finalize the conceptual design plans in order to bring them back to the community for feedback and input," Bryant wrote. "We are hoping to have that meeting in early to mid-November." The Parks Department controls most of the land and pathways within the project site, with the exception of the War Memorial and its pathways, which are under the jurisdiction of the Boston Trust Office (i.e. the White Fund); and the land around the perimeter of the park and on the edges of Agassiz Road, which is under the jurisdiction of the state's Department of Conservation and Recreation.

The project was originally intended to focus on just the pathways themselves and had an estimated cost of around \$6.3 million, but that sum is expected to rise, since the scope was later expanded to include three additional items: the War Memorial; the O'Reilly Memorial; and the new Evans Way Bridge.

to repurpose the existing hotel's ground-floor retail area (an approximately 6,000-square foot hair/nail salon accessible to both hotel guests and non-guests) and third-floor hotel area to create approximately

18,000 square feet of dedicated student amenities, including uses like a student lounge, café/ dining, quiet study area, laundry room, and/or fitness center, according to the BPDA. The project also proposes creating a new main entry to the South Tower for students.

When the hotel's current owner purchased the property, it was their intention to only use the North Tower for hotel purposes, said Quilty, so proceeds from the student housing component will help finance the renovation of the hotel.

In anticipation of the South Tower becoming permanent student housing, the applicant has removed the alcohol license from the South Tower, which will now have only a lodging license, or hotel license, with no alcohol provisions, said Quilty.

Julie Reker, an architect for the project, said an entrance to the elevators in the South Tower at the existing hotel lobby in the North Tower will be closed off, so there is no connection between the two towers.

Meanwhile, an earlier plan to renovate the existing plaza adjacent to the South Tower, which sits atop an underground parking garage, has been improved and expanded, said Reker.

An existing staircase and accessible, sloped brick walkway will remain, she said, while new

trees would be planted throughout the plaza, including in one area, where existing plantings will be replaced with a "more carefully curated plan," including taller trees and "more appropriate, drought-resistant plant-

New planters and planting areas, including one with a seating wall near the entrance, have also been added to the plaza, and in some places, new plantings will fill existing planting beds that now contain gravel. Several new visitor bike racks, along with umbrellas, will also be installed on the plaza, said Reker.

Additionally, an enclosed and secured area for student bike storage, with 102 dedicated bike spaces, will be built next to the South Tower, said Reker, which is a new addition to the project.

Dan Solworth, vice chancellor of wellness and student success for Northeastern, said all mail and packages sent to the occupants of the South Tower would be routed via Northeastern's centralized mail-sorting facility and delivered in bulk by truck to the South Tower's loading dock to greatly reduce the number of individual deliveries to the build-

Two or three parking spaces at the curb, which now accommodate a taxi stand, will be redesignated as space for Lyft and Door-Dash drop-offs, said Howard Moshier, director of land engineering for the civil engineering firm, VHB.

Lee Steele, a member of the city's Impact Advisory Group (IAG) for the project, applauded the addition of new greenery

to the plaza design as "a great improvement" but questioned the "exclusive use of red brick on the plaza floor." He asked for more variety in the color of these materials, especially since the granite walls of the plaza that abut the sidewalk are also red.

"Something a little more interesting than straight-up red brick, I think, would be an aesthetic improvement," said Steele.

Reker responded that the number of new planters being added to the plaza would greatly reduce the number of visible red pavers but added she would bring Steele's request back to the design team for further consider-

Asked when proposed exterior changes to the South Tower would commence, Attorney Quilty said, "There are kids already in these buildings. As soon as we get the green light from the BPDA and the city, we'll be underway."

million visitors to Boston's iconic riverfront. SFF's commitment has secured the future of the project, which will activate the beloved 130-year-old park with more inclusive visitor services, cultural attractions, all-ages play opportunities, nature immersion and environmental stewardship.

"We are thrilled to help bring the gift of a signature park and new visitors center to the historic Esplanade," Debra Smith Knez, chair of the Richard and Susan Smith Family Foundation, said in a press release. "Charlesbank Landing will be a dynamic and accessible destination for residents and visitors alike. We are especially excited about the ways in which it will enrich the park experience for families, helping them fully enjoy the beauty of our riverfront city. Community leader Vanessa Calderón-Rosado will receive Governor's Award in Humanities

Mass Humanities will present one of its Governor's Awards in the Humanities to Vanessa Calderón-Rosado, CEO of Inquilinos Boricuas en Acción, Boston, at an awards ceremony Sept. 28 at the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum in Boston.

Calderón-Rosado has had a long and multi-faceted career demonstrating a commitment to the humanities within education, community development, and philanthropy in Boston and across the state. Calderón-Rosado is being honored for her work that actively promotes Latinx culture and builds community through the arts in Boston's South End and for her contributions to shaping a more equitable philanthropic ecosystem in Massachusetts.

Humbled by the honor

Asked about being recognized by Mass Humanities with the prestigious Governor's Award, Calderón-Rosado said, "This is a very unexpected honor, so I am extremely thrilled, happy, delighted, and humbled by this award, especially because it's centered in the humanities. It may seem a little bit unusual or out of the blue for the kind of work that I do. However, I feel there's great intersectionality between IBA's work and the humanities, so I'm really excited and thrilled."

A Puerto Rican-born civic leader who received her doctorate in public policy from UMASS Boston and a Honoris Causa Doctorate from Cambridge College, Calde-rón-Rosado has been highly acclaimed for her outstanding, exemplary administration of Inquilinos Boricuas en Acción (IBA), a community development corporation dedicated to empowering and engaging individuals and families to improve their lives through high-quality affordable housing, education and arts programs. Under her leadership since 2003, IBA has become the largest Latino-led nonprofit organization in Eastern Massachusetts, with over \$250 mil-lion in assets and a portfolio of 667 afford-able housing units in its South End Villa Victoria development in Roxbury and Mattapan.

Calderón-Rosado said that Inquilinos Boricuas En Acción (which translates to Puerto Rican Tenants in Action) was found-ed in 1968 by a group of Puerto Rican activists that fought for the revitalization of neighborhoods and the development of affordable housing and community programs.

"As we fast forward 55 years later, we con-tinue with that legacy and IBA's mission is to empower individuals and families to im-prove their lives and achieve social and economic mobility through our high-quality affordable housing units, our education, fi-nancial empowerment, and arts programs.

Inspired by her family to give back


Calderón-Rosado was born and raised in Puerto Rico and moved to Boston in 1992 to pursue her Ph.D in Public Policy.

"I had every intention of going back to Puerto Rico, but here I am 31 years later," said Calderón-Rosado. "All my family still lives in Puerto Rico, so I go often."

Calderón-Rosado said her family instilled in her "the important values of giving back and paying it forward."

"Both my mother and father were very politically involved, so I grew up in an environment that was extremely active and en-gaged, in which my family had these important values around equity and justice," said Calderón-Rosado. "That inspired me to dedicate the rest

Simply access the site at mhcmacris. net, and type in your address and you can view an inventory form which describes the architectural style, historical narrative and past resident's biographical informa-

If your home does not have an inventory form, you may research the historic details from multiple sources including deeds, city directories, maps, historic photographs and newspapers.

Recently I researched the history of 53 Chestnut St. in Beacon Hill and uncovered the rich tapestry of events and residents that were connected to that home. The home at 53 Chestnut was constructed in 1828 by Housewrights Hiram and Benjamin Bosworth on land that was originally owned by Boston's first English settler, William Blaxton. It is a prime example of the quality Federal Style homes built on Beacon Hill in the early 19th century. The gracious Palladian window is a unique architectural element that reflects the intricately carved fanlight above the entry.

Sculptor Florence "Flori" Freeman lived at 53 Chestnut with her parents and siblings in the 1850s. Flori was friends with Anne Whitney and trained by Richard Greenough. She created several pieces that exist nearby

Today, including a marble bust of Archangel Sandalphon. It was gifted to Longfellow, and is on

today in the Longfellow House Museum in Cambridge.

Freeman also created a beautifully detailed, marble chimney piece depicting children and a yule log that won honorable mention at the Philadelphia Centennial Fair in 1876. The mantle is still in place today in a residence on Mt. Vernon Street.

Additional residents included a Harvard law professor and a wellknown playwright and manager of The Boston Globe Theatre. Each resident has lovingly maintained the key historical defining characteristics that are difficult to replicate. of Music, under the guidance of Professors Alexander Korsantia and Dang Thai Son.






